If you need to leave the service to avoid disturbing others, please note that the service can be watched on livestream, this week in the kindergarten.

To help us to separate Shabbat from the rest of the week, please switch off your mobile phone, and do not take photographs or video, or smoke/vape on the premises on Shabbat.

When we want to show appreciation during a service, it is traditional not to applaud but to shout 'yasher koach' or 'sh'koach', which means 'strength to you.' Please refrain from applauding but join in this greeting.

We are delighted that thew building work has been completed and there will be an opportunity for you to spend some time in the new building. Please bear with us as we take time make it our home.

We are grateful for your understanding over recent months.

- In case of an emergency, evacuation of the building is either through the main entrance doors, congregating on Temple Grove, or via the kindergarten into the cemetery. Please do not gather on Alyth Gardens as this may block emergency services access.

- The main toilets continue to be upstairs. These can be accessed using the stairs outside the kindergarten. There is also a, fully accessible toilet downstairs. Please use the facilities upstairs if you are able, to leave the accessible toilet for those who need it.

- We will make Kiddush together over wine and challah on Friday nights and Shabbat mornings to end our services. We ask that you please not drink or eat until we have said the blessings.

- Please help us to look after the siddurim and kiddush glasses by putting them on the tables at the back of the Beit Tefillah as you leave.

¹⁰ When you make a loan of any sort to your compatriot, you must not enter the house to seize the pledge.¹¹ You must remain outside, while the party to whom you made the loan brings the pledge out to you.¹² If that party is needy, you shall not go to sleep in that pledge; ¹⁵ you must return the pledge at sundown, that its owner may sleep in the cloth and bless you; and it will be to your merit before the Eternal your God, ¹⁴ You shall not abuse a needy and destitute laborer, whether a fellow Israelite or a stranger in one of the communities of your land. ¹⁵ You must pay out the wages due on the same day, before the sun sets, for the worker is needy and urgently depends on it; else a cry to the Eternal will be issued against you and you will incur quilt.

¹⁶ Parents shall not be put to death for children, nor children be put to death for parents: they shall each be put to death only for their own crime. ¹⁷ You shall not subvert the rights of the stranger or the fatherless; you shall not take a widow's garment in pawn.¹⁸ Remember that you were a slave in Egypt and that the Eternal your God redeemed you from there; therefore do I enjoin you to observe this commandment.¹⁹ When you reap the harvest in your field and overlook a sheaf in the field, do not turn back to get it; it shall go to the stranger, the fatherless, and the widow—in order that the Eternal your God may bless you in all your undertakings. 20 When you beat down the fruit of your olive trees, do not go over them again; that shall go to the stranger, the fatherless, and the widow.²¹ When you gather the grapes of your vineyard, do not pick it over again; that shall go to the stranger, the fatherless, and the widow.²² Always remember that you were a slave in the land of Egypt; therefore do I enjoin you to observe this commandment.

¹ When there is a dispute between two parties and they go to law, and a decision is rendered declaring the one in the right and the other in the wrong $-^{2}$ if the guilty one is to be flogged, the magistrate shall have the person lie down and shall supervise the giving of lashes, by count, as warranted by the offense.³ The guilty one may be given up to forty lashes, but not more, lest being flogged further, to excess, your peer be degraded before your eyes.⁴ You shall not muzzle an ox while it is threshing.
